

COLLABORATION IS ALLYSHIP: HOW CAMPUS LEADERS CAN SUPPORT UNDOCUMENTED STUDENT SUCCESS

This resource includes information and best practices that you can leverage to improve and streamline the undocumented student experience. The California Community College system enrolls the largest population of undocumented students of any segment of public higher education. When undocumented immigrants can pursue their career and professional goals free of institutional barriers and discrimination, they are able to reach their educational goals and, in turn, contribute to the improvement of their communities and our economy. Supporting all students, regardless of their status, is core to the California Community Colleges mission.

ADDRESS UNIQUE NEEDS OF UNDOCUMENTED STUDENTS

All faculty, staff, and administrators must develop a shared understanding of the unique needs and challenges that our undocumented students continue to face, especially as the fate of the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) Program remains uncertain. Most of our undocumented students do not have DACA status. This recognition is critical to understanding the lives and experiences of our undocumented students, many of whom are shut out by income generating opportunities and temporary protections that DACA offers.

ACTIONS TO TAKE

- Stay informed. Utilize and communicate the availability of training modules within the Vision Resource Center.
- Help your colleagues on campus stay informed by hosting Ally trainings for faculty, administrators, and staff. These trainings also allow spaces for staff to engage in dialogue about structures and practices that may be hindering access for undocumented students.

- You may be working with students who are seeking to transfer. Develop partnerships with other educational institutions and community-based organizations in your region to discuss opportunities for creating streamlined transfer experiences for students.
- Develop clear policies that contain shared expectations for engaging with undocumented students.
 These policies should also summarize California's sanctuary laws (i.e., SB 54), data protections, and other legislation intended to expand higher education access and professional careers among

INFORMATION SHARING, PARTNERSHIPS, AND COLLABORATION

It can be difficult to keep up with all the information, news, and policies regarding undocumented students. Students are counting on us to mobilize and respond to their unique challenges and having the most up-to-date, accurate information related to undocumented students is essential. Providing wrong information to students can have serious consequences. Below are some recommendations to take to help ensure timely flow and sharing of information between campus staff and students. These recommendations can also help you build stronger partnerships across campus and within your community – a key strategy to building ecosystems of support.

ACTIONS TO TAKE

- Sign up for newsletters and listservs to receive the latest news, research, and information related to undocumented students. These tools can be useful in your discussions with other campus departments.
- Host a town hall with students, faculty, staff, administrators, and community stakeholders (including locally elected officials) to discuss how best to support their undocumented population.

ENGAGEMENT IN POLICY ADVOCACY

Campus engagement in local, state, and federal advocacy is encouraged. Policymakers appreciate hearing from their campus leaders to learn what is working and what is not. As an ally, you are in a unique position to elevate the inspiring stories of undocumented students with elected officials and call on your representatives to support undocumented student success. Community colleges are constituents of our elected officials, and your voices are instrumental in ensuring that they are aware of any challenges that need to be addressed.

ACTIONS TO TAKE

- Meet with your local state and Congressional representatives and urge them to support policies that uplift and empower undocumented students. Invite students to join these meetings with you.
- Create messages or public statements in support of undocumented students and reaffirm your campus support. Remind students that college is free and accessible to them, regardless of their immigration status.
- If you have not done so already, consider creating a task force dedicated to examining undocumented student experiences. Invite students to be on this taskforce.

2024

- Supporting Undocumented Students in Uncertain Times: Addressing Challenges and Fostering Allyship
 - Description: Join the Student Senate for California Community Colleges for a
 webinar exploring many of the barriers undocumented students encounter—
 from financial aid limitations and legal vulnerabilities to mental health
 struggles—and examine how colleges, faculty, and peers can take concrete steps
 to support and uplift these students.
- <u>Unlocking Financial Aid Opportunities: Maximizing State Financial Aid Programs</u>
 - Description: This session provides a comprehensive overview of financial aid for undocumented students in California, highlighting recent updates and ongoing challenges. It covers the latest changes to the CA Dream Act Application (CADAA), eligibility criteria, and financial aid policies, using data from the California Student Aid Commission's "Renewing the Dream" report.
- Pathways to Belonging: Understanding Naturalization and Lawful Permanent Residency in the U.S
 - Description: This session explains the distinctions between obtaining lawful permanent residency (often referred to as obtaining a Green Card) and naturalization, the process leading to U.S. citizenship. It offers insights into the step-by-step process of applying for citizenship. Additionally, the webinar covers the myriad benefits and protections afforded to U.S. citizens, highlighting the tangible and intangible advantages of naturalization.
- Bridging the Gap: Enhancing Culturally Competent Mental Health Care Access in the Undocumented Community
 - Description: This session explores the unique challenges faced by undocumented students and professionals in accessing culturally competent mental health care and navigating workplace barriers. Panelists share insights on improving

representation, advocacy, and holistic support for the undocumented community, offering strategies to foster resilience and well-being.

2023

- Cultivating Belonging for Undocumented Students in Teaching & Learning Spaces
 - Description: Academic Senate for California Community Colleges (ASCCC) faculty panelists discuss elevating pedagogical, counseling, and mentoring practices, as well as institutional structures/programs which welcome undocumented students and help them feel a sense of belonging.
- Advocacy in Action: Strategies for Local, State and Federal Advocacy
 - Description: This webinar provides an overview of the various forms of oncampus and off-campus advocacy to advance undocumented student success.
 Presenters will also offer a framework for how campus leaders can engage in undocumented student advocacy at their local campus.
- Championing Equity through AB 540: Increasing Access for Undocumented Students
 - Description: Learn about the new groundbreaking, systemwide AB 540 FAQ. This first-of-its-kind tool will allow more effective implementation of this important tuition equity policy across all public higher education systems in California.

2022

- Collaborative Ecosystems that Support Undocumented Students
 - Description: This webinar provides an overview of the various forms of oncampus and off-campus advocacy to advance undocumented student success.
 Presenters offer a framework for how campus leaders can engage in undocumented student advocacy at their local campus, and the importance of state and federal policies that eliminate barriers, prioritize affordability and access, and create the conditions for unconditional belonging and ultimately – student success.
- Centering the Undocumented Student Experience Through Campuswide Collaboration
 - Description: Campus stakeholder collaboration into a students' educational journey and their goals to achieve a degree, credential or transfer to a four-year university is essential. These silos can sometimes be hidden but their effects are clearly visible in a student's experience. Recent policy reforms have been designed with the intention of breaking down silos and fostering greater campus collaboration. This webinar provides participants with an overview of recent policies that inform a supportive ecosystem that supports undocumented student success and will provide a framework for how they can create an ecosystem of unconditional belonging for students.
